Washington Partners Provide Chilean Flood Relief

Abnormally heavy seasonal rainstorms recently caused serious residential damage and significant loss of personal property in many of Santiago's and its surrounding region's poorer communities. The Emergency Preparedness Committee and the Board of the Washington State Partners coordinated a financial disaster relief effort with the Chilean Partners President, Jorge Valenzuela. Washington Partners members contributed \$565 by the end of June. The Board had earlier voted to match up to \$500 in contributions. Therefore, the amount of \$1,065 was transferred to the Chilean Partners for distribution to two organizations: the Foundation to Overcome Poverty and Artisans for Life. The Chilean Partners had identified these two organizations as providers of services to the poor in the areas affected by the flooding.

November 2001 Convention

Bill Zachmann, Patricia Olson, Susan Sola and Paula Laschober represented the Washington Partners at the 2001 Partners International Convention in Orlando, Florida, in November. Paula provided pre-Convention training to new Partners leaders via a workshop on participative strategic planning. The two-hour interactive workshop focused first on membership issues, then went on to incorporate other issues of concern to the participants.

Board Member Rodrigo Yáñez on Trade Mission to Chile and Brazil

In early November 2001 Rodrigo Yáñez, chair of the Economic Development Committee, went to Chile with travel grant support from the Washington Partners' travel fund. He was a member of a trade mission to Chile and Brazil which was sponsored by the Washington Office of Trade and Economic Development (OTED). While on the mission, Rodrigo was able to meet with several of the Chilean Partners and other interested potential members, and provide information about Partners to various audiences.

He was invited to give a presentation about Partners to a combined delegation of the Washington trade mission and an Alaskan trade mission, as well as their Chilean hosts. Likewise, the Chilean Partners hosted a reception at the Instituto Norteamericano de Cultura for Partners members and the trade mission members. The trade mission itself was also arranged by a Washington Partners member, Tania Fernández de Castro, who is the Latin America Program Manager for OTED.

Chilean Ambassador Andrés Bianchi and Chilean Consul General Fernando Varela were hosted by the Washington Partners, Program for Appropriate Technology in Health (PATH), and the Office of Trade and Economic Development (OTED) at a reception at PATH headquarters in Seattle on October 18, 2001. The Ambassador was in the area as the keynote speaker at the Latin American Summit in Tacoma, which was co-sponsored by OTED and the World Trade Center of Tacoma.

Many local Chileans from the Chilean Cultural Center, including President Fernando Moraga, were in attendance, as were Gates Foundation representatives and a group of Chilean trainers being trained under a grant from the foundation with the intent of computerizing Chilean libraries. One of the trainers was Pilar Pacheco, who had been in Seattle in January 2000 on a Partners-sponsored ESL teacher exchange. Other honored guests included Larry Williams, Assistant Director of OTED, State Representative Phyllis Gutierrez Kenney, and Honorary Chilean Consul for Washington, Jorge Gilbert.

Chilean Travelers Hosted by Washington Partners

Not all Chilean visitors hosted by the Washington Partners come on Partners grants.

In January, 2002, at the request of the World Affairs Council, Board member Sr. Yvette Mallow hosted a dinner for Alvaro Fernández, who was traveling in the U.S. under the State Department's International Visitor Program. He is the editor of the opinion page of the *El Mercurio* newspaper and a professor of criminal law at the Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile.

In June, Sr. Yvette also hosted a reception for Sr. Francisca Morales, the Superior General of the Congregation of Amor Misericordioso. Sr. Francisca is the director of a home for young, poor unwed mothers in Santiago. Sr. Yvette spent several years at the home working with the young mothers and their babies.

Also in June, the Education Committee met at Paula Laschober's home for a potluck dinner in honor of Javiera Gómez, a legal student from Diego Portales University in Santiago, who was in Seattle to attend the National Education for Women's Leadership Institute-Puget Sound. The institute was sponsored by the Center for Women and Democracy at the University of Washington. Its purpose is to encourage undergraduate women students to undertake policy-making roles in society.

Potential Partners Projects

Health Committee: Paul Mocha is working on bringing a social worker to Washington. He has been corresponding with Jorge Valenzuela about the possibilities.

Education: Through his contacts with the World Baseball Foundation, Jerry Thornton, is working on bringing Chilean baseball coaches to Washington under a new Partners initiative, the Coaching Coaches Program. Paula Laschober is working with Chilean Partner Jackie Núñez on sending Washington ESL teachers to Chile.

Arts & Culture: Paula Laschober is also working on sending local documentary film maker BJ Bullert to Chile in November to participate in the Chilean International Short Film Festival. This is an initiative of the Chilean Arts and Culture Committee. Many thanks to Peggy Weiss, coordinator of the art program at Harborview Medical Center, for finding us a great candidate.
